Requirements

A current license, signed in ink, is required for persons age 16 and over, to fish for any species of fish and to take fishbait, baitfish, and species of amphibians and reptiles from Commonwealth waters and by those legal methods established by Commonwealth law.

Lack of knowledge is not a defense for illegal harvesting of fish. Become familiar with all requirements and laws at www.fishandboat.com

A license shall be kept about the person while fishing and shown upon request to any waterways patrolman or other officer designated by the PA Fish and Boat Commission. In addition to showing the license / permit to the officer, the holder thereof shall, upon demand, provide further identification to the satisfaction of the officer by producing some other positive means of identification.

In other words, carry a State issued Identification to confirm who you are and have it readily available for presentation.

Licensing and Permits

Fishing licenses are sold by license issuing agents through an electronic point-of-sale system. This system brings increased efficiency, more options, and easier upgrades for anglers.

Mentored Youth Trout Days

Youth Anglers must obtain a current year Mentored Youth Permit or a Voluntary Fishing License and be accompanied by a licensed adult angler with a trout permit (16 years or older) to participate.

This is NOT intended for adult anglers to get a jump start on trout season. Play by the rules and enjoy the opportunity it's intended to provide.





Responsibilities

Learn the rules and follow them. Prepare yourself properly with the right tackle and equipment for the species of fish you intend to harvest and the conditions you want to harvest them in.

Respect the waterways that provide the fish and follow the "Leave no Trace" guidelines of planning for your outing, proper waste disposal, respect wildlife, and respect your fellow anglers.

It is each angler's responsibility to be aware of and to follow legal fishing practices. Ignorance of Fishing Regulations and Commonwealth laws are not a valid defense for violating them.

Know proper catch and release procedures. You're not always going to catch "the big one" or "the right one," so know the proper techniques to handle this situation when it happens.



Paddling Safety Tips

- Wear your life jacket and ensure all other participants are as well
- Be prepared to swim If the water looks too rough to swim, don't paddle it. If it looks like an area you shouldn't paddle, then don't
- Practice Portage (carry your boat around sketchy areas)
- If you capsize HOLD ON TO YOUR BOAT
- Wear appropriate footwear, you never know if you'll have to walk where you paddle
- · Research your route to help avoid issues
- NEVER tether two people together, especially children
- File your trip plan with a reliable person that isn't with you with your finish window and let them know when you've finished
- Never boat alone, safety in numbers
- Never take your boat nearby, or go over, a low-dam head regardless
 of upstream or downstream
- Expect to get wet and bring extra clothing in a waterproof bag

Water Hazards Are A Thing!

Dams: Water going over a dam creates a back current, or undertow, that can pull a boat into the turbulence and capsize it. It can cause occupants and the boat to become trapped underwater. **AVOID THEM ALWAYS.**

Current: Never underestimate the power of moving water. If it looks rough, it is. Don't overestimate your ability and stay aware of water speed.

Strainers: Trees in and under the surface do not stop water flow around them. Be aware of current changes near them as they can trap and flood your boat.

Cold Water: Sudden immersion can cause body temp decrease that can lead to disorientation, shock, and cardiac arrest. Hypothermia is possible so get out of the water and get dry/warm as soon as possible. (DO NOT rub areas of the body exposed warm them with layers and dryness.) Wear easily dryable and breathable material in cooler weather, like wool, and avoid cotton material that absorbs heavily and dries slowly.

Heat Stroke and Sunburn: When the sun is bright wear sunglasses to help protect from water reflection burning your eyes. Wear lighter clothing, hats, screening to protect your skin. Drink plenty of water.



Pennsylvania Paddling Regulations

One Coast Guard approved Personal Flotation Device (PFD) that is serviceable and appropriately sized is required for each person in your boat. Life jackets must always be worn by all boat occupants 12 years and younger, while on the water. Others are strongly encouraged to wear a life jacket while on the water. (*ALL BOATERS ARE REQUIRED TO WEAR A LIFEJACKET DURING COLD WEATHER MONTHS [Nov 1 – April 30] REGARDLESS OF AGE OR BOAT UNDER 16 FEET.) All boaters are required to wear a lifejacket on all Pittsburgh District U.S. Army Corps of Engineers lakes (only) in all crafts under 16 ft.

If your boat is 16 ft. in length (or more), you're required to have a throwable floatation device as well. Kayaks & canoes are exempt from carrying a throwable device.

Unpowered boats (canoes, kayaks, standup paddleboards, rowboats, rafts) using PA Fish & Boat Commission or PA state parks or forests access areas must either be registered OR display a valid launch use permit. Out of state permits are NOT recognized.

Operating watercraft, including canoes, kayaks, and rafts while under the influence of alcohol or drugs is illegal. This law is strictly enforced to ensure user / paddler safety.


Boating and Alcohol


It is illegal to operate a boat while under the influence of alcohol (or any controlled substance) The consequences are not worth the risk, **DON'T DO IT!**






